



Chocolate Crinkle Cookies

Ingredients needed:

1/2 cup unsweetened cocoa powder

1 cup granulated sugar

1/4 cup vegetable or canola oil

2 large eggs

1 tsp vanilla extract

1 cup all purpose flour

1 tsp baking powder

1/4 tsp salt

1/2 cup confectioners sugar

Directions:In a mixing bowl, combine

sugar, cocoa powder, oil, vanilla, and eggs. Whisk until the mixture is smooth. In a separate bowl, combine flour, baking powder and salt. Add the flour mixture to the cocoa mixture and stir to combine.

Cover the dough with plastic wrap and refrigerate for at least 3 hours and up to overnight.

Preheat oven to 350F. Scoop dough with a mini ice cream scoop for even sizing into 20 cookies, then roll dough into even balls. Roll each into powdered sugar. Place, evenly spaced, on cookie sheet. Bake for 10 -12 minutes. Allow to cool slightly then move to wire rack to cool fully.

White Chicken Chili Ingredients needed:

1 Can (10 oz) green enchilada sauce

2 cans Great Northern Beans (or 1 Great Northern and One black bean) drained and rinsed

1 lb boneless, skinless breast or thighs

1 1/2 cups frozen corn

2 cans diced fire-roasted green chiles, undrained

3/4 tsp dried oregano & paprika

1Tblsp ground chili powder & cumin

2 cups chicken stock

1 block cream cheese

Salt and pepper to taste

Directions: Spray crock pot with non-stick spray or use a liner! Trim fat off thighs or breasts. If using breasts cut into pieces. Put in the bottom of the crockpot. Add enchilada sauce, beans, corn, chiles, oregano, chili powder, cumin, paprika, salt and pepper. I add about 1 tsp of salt and 1/2 tsp of pepper. Add chicken stock. Stir everything. Make sure chicken is submerged.

Cover and cook on low for 5-7 hours or high 3-5 hours.

Take out chicken and shred it. Set aside. Soften cream cheese in microwave and add to crockpot. Let stand covered until melted completely. Add chicken and stir together.

Serve with Mexican or taco cheese, Avacado, tortillas, sourcream, cilantro.

Not necessarily because they don't know Jesus but maybe because they feel separated by anxiety, depression, substance abuse, internet interference...trust me, I believe, with our youth, this is a real issue. So many today, are bombarded with outside interference and don't have strong parental guidance at home to show them the way. Many are un-churched. If only they could hear this song! Jesus does "bring dead things back to life"! I pray each day for guidance and wisdom to be the proof my students and others need to see this truth. I want others to see Jesus in me. I know, many days, I may not show Him as clearly as others but I try.
